Colorectal cancer is the second most deadly form of cancer, but it doesn't have to be.

Screening can prevent the cancer or catch it early when it's highly treatable.

But, too few men and women in Oregon over 50 (45 for African Americans) are being screened.

People who have been screened can play a significant role in changing this. Research shows that most people get screened because they were encouraged by someone they know and trust.

If you've been screened for colorectal cancer, please talk about your experience and encourage others to get screened too.

Consider sharing this information:

- Everyone over the age of 50 (45 for African Americans) should be screened for colorectal cancer, even if they have no family history or symptoms.
- There are several reliable screening options — some cost as little as \$25 and all are covered by insurance. Visit our website for information on screening and treatment, whether you have insurance or not.
- Talk to your doctor about the screening option that is right for you.
- Make and keep your appointment to be screened. **Then do what we're doing: *tell someone else.***
